Time for African leaders to look beyond American democracy

- Our continent has always been one of rich cultures and diverse traditions. There are, however, consequences of colonialism and globalisation. One of these is that we have been forced to adopt foreign political models that do not align with our unique values and biases.
- 2 The effects of these actions have been devastating.
- This is particularly true in the case of the democratic system borrowed from the West, which has caused significant harm to the social fabric of many African countries. Therefore, it is time for the African family of nations to rethink their approach to democracy and take ownership of their political systems. In doing this, Africa can create a democracy that is uniquely tailored to the needs of its people. We can create a better future for all.
- The time has come for our leaders to reflect on this and to produce a representative government not shaped on American democracy. There is an urgency as another 'Summit for Democracy' is being organised by America where many African leaders have been invited to be lectured to by President Joe Biden on democracy.
- Many grassroot politicians are convinced that many African countries will continue to be in crisis if they do not develop a government that will take into consideration the culture and values cherished by their people. To them (and many of us), America is not in a position to teach Africans how to govern their countries.
- Indeed, America's hypocrisy (when it comes to democracy) is its own history of institutionalised racism and discrimination. For centuries, the US was a slave-holding nation, where African Americans were bought and sold as property, denied basic human rights, and subjected to brutal violence. The US only began to fully recognise the civil rights of African Americans in the 1960s, after decades of hard-fought battles and social movements.
- 7 This dark history makes it difficult for the US to claim any sort of moral superiority when it comes to democracy.
- Furthermore, the US's own democratic institutions have come under attack in recent years, calling into question its ability to serve as a role model for other countries. In 2021, militant supporters of former President Donald Trump, who refused to accept the results of a democratic election, stormed the US Capitol. This attack, on the very heart of US democracy, was a shocking reminder of the fragile state of democratic institutions. This becomes more obvious when danger is posed by those who would undermine and destroy democracy.

- The US's track-record in international affairs also calls into question its authority to lecture African countries about democracy. The US has a long history of supporting authoritarian regimes and overthrowing democratically elected leaders in other countries, often to protect its own interests. For example, in 1973, the US supported the overthrowing of the democratically elected government, in Chile, and installed a brutal dictator who ruled for 17 years. Similarly, the US has been accused of propping up dictators in Africa and other parts of the world, while ignoring or even undermining democratic movements and their leaders.
- Moreover, the US's current political climate is highly divided and often hostile. The political narrative in the US has become increasingly toxic, with each side demonising the other and engaging in vicious personal attacks. The media landscape is also highly divided, with many news outlets and social media platforms spreading misinformation and conspiracy theories. All of these factors contribute to a political environment that is not favourable to democracy. Surely?
- 11 It is difficult for the US to claim any sort of moral authority when it comes to lecturing other countries about democratic values.
- American democracy also has some issues with money and identity politics, and some African countries that copied the American system have similar problems. You must be a moneybag to contest and win major elections and you must be associated with godfathers or cabal¹. The effect of this is the corruption that follows when a candidate wins and assumes office.
- The other unpleasant aspect, which is causing tension and violence is the multi-party system borrowed from the West. This system causes tension before, during and after an election. It also affects the social fabric of those countries copying the American form of democracy because it creates a class system: those who are wealthy, while the majority live in poverty. The negative impact of forcing Western democratic models on Africa's political and social structures cannot be ignored.
- Though there is no perfect democracy anywhere in the world, my belief is that it is urgent that African countries consider their own needs and create a democracy that best serves her people. Our leaders must prioritise the needs of our people. Our leaders must work towards building a democracy that reflects the needs of our people. as cold as sorrow. Presidents decree but rain soaks paper promises, tearing, as democracy parades through the streets.



Like driving drops or drizzle, paring warmth from skin, dissolving, wearing: they permeate, the poor, their eyes and knees, as democracy parades through the streets



Or is it their love of darkness holds them suspect?	20




